


An open-air museum that doesn't need much planning to visit.

St Peter's Dome is the Vatican's symbol. You can admire it in a new light from Villa del Priorato di Malta on the Aventine Hill.



The **Pyramid of Cestius** is near Porta San Paolo, in the Piazzale Ostiense area. This 36 m tall Egyptian-style pyramid was built as a tomb for Gaius Cestius.



Trastevere, **Rome's bohémien quarter**, is one of the most enchanting places, attracting tourists from all over the world. It's the coolest place where to dine with friends and enjoy the most delicious food.


A **cuisine** that even Romans love

Starter

Bruschetta topped with tomatoes or Roman-style suppli

First course

Rigatoni all'amatriciana or alla gricia

Second course

Abbacchio (freshly slaughtered suckling lamb) and Roman-style meatballs

Dessert

Tiramisù or ricotta tart

Tuscia Viterbese




This ancient **Etruscan land stretches** as far as Tuscany and Umbria.


This is still a relatively unknown area but well worth exploring. You can rent a car in Rome and reach ancient villages, historic villas, and lush landscapes in no time.

CALCATA: the village of witches

An enchanting medieval village dominating the Treja Valley.
According to the legend, you can hear witches sing in the streets when the wind blows hard.
A small fortified village that perfectly blends in with the surroundings. You can visit the Anguillara castle, artisan workshops, and the Monte Gelato Waterfalls.



SUTRI: the ancient town



Calcata is near Sutri, another village where time seems to have stopped in the Middle Ages.

A walk through the streets of the town centre up to Sutri's regional nature park: seven hectares stretching over the slopes of the Cimini and Sabatini Mountains. A protected area that develops on a tuffaceous plateau treasuring important archaeological sites, such as the Roman Amphitheatre and the Necropolis.


CIVITA DI BAGNOREGIO: the dying city

It's perhaps the best-known tourist destination in the Tuscia area. Every year, over 700,000 people from all over the world visit it.

A small village that seems suspended in the air and that you can reach only by crossing a narrow footbridge. From here, you can admire the beautiful Calanchi Valley and a landscape that keeps changing due to weathering. That's why it's called the "dying city".



CELLENO: the ghost city



A relatively unknown village with less than 1500 inhabitants. It's built on a spur of tufa rock with a spectacular view.


Celleno has been devastated by natural disasters such as epidemics, landslides, and earthquakes, forcing residents to flee. That's why it's still called the ghost city.

Lake Bolsena

This tour around the Tuscia area can end with a relaxing weekend at Lake Bolsena, a volcanic lake between Umbria and Tuscany.

It's the perfect destination for a day trip in spring and summer. From here, you can also visit Montefiascone and Capodimonte, take a boat trip around the Bisentina and Martana islands, or sunbathe on the beautiful beaches with crystal clear and shallow water.





A journey across **Tuscia**'s flavours

Acquacotta is a typical local dish that stems from this area's rural tradition. It's a hot broth-based soup with vegetables, herbs, bread and an egg.

If you like soups, you cant' leave without having the **chickpea** and **chestnut** or the **fish soup**, which the locals around Lake Bolsena call **Sbroscia**.

The Tuscia culinary tradition also includes the **Fregnacce**, made with water, flour, eggs and sprinkled with pecorino cheese. Depending on where you go, you can call them **Bertolacce**, **Stracci**, or **Pizzacce**, but the recipe won't change.

And if you have a sweet tooth, you can't say no to the **ceciaroli**, a sort of fried ravioli filled with chickpea and cocoa cream.








