Innovation is at every corner, especially in the non-touristy areas, where you can perceive it in all its essence. This guide will show you a different way to travel. And it's going to be fun!


# THE MILAN YOU DON'T EXPECT

# The Straight, the Crooked, and the Curved



The **Portello district** includes CityLife, a modern complex of houses and buildings like those you see in major international cities. **Piazza Tre Torri** – the beating heart of this area – opens up to one of the city's most beautiful **skylines**. The three towers house the headquarters of major insurance companies like Generali, Allianz, and Pwc. Fun fact: due to their unique shape, these three buildings are also known as the *Straight*, the *Crooked*, and the *Curved*.

# A journey across Milan's murals



From the eastern suburbs of Milan, you can reach the **Ortica district**, known for its **street art**. This area features beautiful murals representing **historic and religious** artworks, such as the Cathedral's centre nave in **Via Pitteri**. The Ortica district is well worth a visit whether you're a street art fan or not.

# Brera, Milan's Montmartre



Despite its proximity to the historic centre, this area is very quiet. It's the perfect place to wander around the alleys. The name **Brera comes from braida**, a dialect word that means "**uncultivated land**" since there wasn't much around until the mid-18th century. Today, it's **one of the most renowned places in Milan**, ideal for artists who are looking for the right inspiration.

# MILAN'S NIGHTLIFE



# **EATING WELL ON A BUDGET**

You may not believe it, but it's possible! Highly recommended places where you can treat yourself

- Macelleria Popolari at the Navigli: the queen of street food in Milan;
- Madama Hostel & Bistrot: near the Prada Foundation, if you like a youthful setting;
- Il Mare Culturale Urbano: an open-air farmhouse where they also organise events and workshops. If you like ethnic food, you're in the right place!

# Speak like a local! Let's learn some words in Milanese



**Scighera:** literally means fog. In Milan, we use this word when the fog is so thick that you can't see anything. This term comes from the Latin word "caecus", i.e., blind, something that obscures sight.

**Sghei:** when we say "sghei", we mean money. Originally, they were the coins used in the Austro-Hungarian Empire (Scheidemünze in German, literally translated as divisional coin).

**Dis'cioles:** (pronounced "dis'chooles") means "hurry up," "wake up", "suit yourself". We use this expression to urge someone to make a decision.

**Tel chì / Tel lì:** We bet this is the first expression you'll learn as soon as you set foot in Milan. It means "here it is/here they are", and we say it all the time.

**Sciura:** means a high-class elegant lady (follow @sciuraglam on Instagram!).

## **Val Brembana**



# SYMMETRICAL LANDSCAPES


Lombardy is known to be the Italian region with the highest number of lakes. The most famous ones are **Lake Maggiore**, **Lake Garda** and **Lake Iseo**. However, we want to show you the lesser-known ones:

## Lake Idro

A blue gem in Northern Italy between Lake Garda and Lake Iseo, between woods and mountains. A corner of paradise one hour away from Brescia.









# **Briantei Lakes**

These glacial lakes are located between Como and Lecco. In less than one hour from Milan, you can reach lake Annone, the largest in this constellation of lakes, but also Lake Pusiano, Lake Segrino, Lake Alserio, and if you continue in the direction of Como, you'll find lake Montorfano.

# **NATURE AND...**

This region is also home to some of the most beautiful art cities in Italy.

## **Mantova**

The city of the Gonzaga dynasty home to breathtaking landmarks, like San Giorgio Castle, Palazzo Te, and the Palazzo Ducale. From here, you can reach Sabbioneta, a UNESCO World Heritage Site since 2008.

During your visit, remember to leave room for a gastronomic experience. Pick a small, family-run tavern where you can try some of our typical dishes: pumpkin tortelli, agnoli, riso alla pilota, you name it!



## Cremona

A stroll around the main streets is enough to realise how beautiful the "city of violins" is. From Piazza del Comune, you can visit Torrazzo, Italy's highest bell tower, the Cathedral, and the violin museum.

And for your lunch break, you can stop to eat some traditional specialities, like cured meats and cheese, marubini, gran bollito, and nougat.

# Monza

You can't go to Monza without visiting the Cathedral and the Chapel of Queen Theodolinda. We also recommend leaving some time to visit the Royal Villa, also known as the Royal Palace of Monza. It was built in the 8th century as the Habsburgs' private residence, and includes 28 rooms and Royal Gardens.
